Narrative Information

Overview

The purpose of the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) is to support state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare the Nation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. HSGP provides funding to implement investments that build, sustain, and deliver the 32 core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal (the Goal) of a secure and resilient Nation. The building, sustainment, and delivery of these core capabilities are not exclusive to any single level of government, organization, or community, but rather, require the combined effort of the whole community. HSGP supports core capabilities across the five mission areas of Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery based on allowable costs.

The funding announcement, located on the eGrants Calendar page, describes the organization types, activities, and costs that are eligible under the announcement. The PSO's eGrants User Guide to Creating an Application guides applicants through the process of creating and submitting an application in eGrants. Primary Mission and Purpose

State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) - Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Activities (LETPA): Supports state, tribal and local preparedness activities that continue to build law enforcement capabilities to prevent terrorist attacks and support critical prevention and protection activities. All LETPA investments must be consistent with capability targets set during the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) process, and gaps identified in the State Preparedness Report (SPR).

Many activities which support the achievement of target capabilities related to terrorism preparedness may simultaneously support enhanced preparedness for other hazards unrelated to acts of terrorism. However, all SHSP-LETPA projects must assist grantees in achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, or protecting against acts of terrorism.

Eligibility Requirements

Cybersecurity Training Requirement

Local units of governments must comply with the Cybersecurity Training requirements described in Section 772.012 and Section 2054.5191 of the Texas Government Code. Criminal History Reporting

Entities receiving funds from PSO must be located in a county that has an average of 90% or above on both adult and juvenile dispositions entered into the computerized criminal history database maintained by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) as directed in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Chapter 66. The disposition completeness percentage is defined as the percentage of arrest charges a county reports to DPS for which a disposition has been subsequently reported and entered into the computerized criminal history system.

Counties applying for grant awards from the Office of the Governor must commit that the county will report at least 90% of convictions within five business days to the Criminal Justice Information System at the Department of Public Safety.

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)

Eligible applicants operating a law enforcement agency must be current on reporting complete UCR data and the Texas specific reporting mandated by 411.042 TGC, to the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) for inclusion in the annual Crime in Texas (CIT) publication. To be considered eligible for funding, applicants must have submitted a full twelve months of accurate data to DPS for the most recent calendar year by the deadline(s) established by DPS. Due to the importance of timely reporting, applicants are required to submit complete and accurate UCR data, as well as the Texas-mandated reporting, on a no less than monthly basis and respond promptly to requests from DPS related to the data submitted.

National Incident Management System (NIMS) Implementation

Grantees are required to implement NIMS. The NIMS uses a systematic approach to integrate the best existing processes and methods into a unified national framework for incident management across all homeland security activities including prevention, protection, response, mitigation, and recovery. Grantees must use standardized resource management concepts for resource typing, credentialing, and an inventory to facilitate the effective identification, dispatch, deployment, tracking and recovery of resources.

Emergency Management Plans (Intermediate Level)

Plans must be maintained throughout the entire grant performance period. - Recovery. Recover through a focus on the timely restoration, strengthening and revitalization of infrastructure, housing and a sustainable economy, as well as the health, social, cultural, historic and environmental fabric of communities affected by a catastrophic incident.

Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Activities (LETPA)

The Lubbock County Sheriff's Office host the Regional Bomb Squad, a FEMA Type I Bomb Squad which is available to respond and assist throughout the 15 county South Plains Region and an additional 7 counties in their assigned service area. This project will enhance officer safety and personal protection when responding to Terrorist related Incidents involving Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear threats. Lubbock County is the only Type I Bomb Squad within our region. This suit is required piece of PPE for Bomb Technicians. Bomb Suit replacement is now required at specific time intervals. This Ensures a safe and secure environment through law enforcement and related security and protection operations for people and communities located within affected areas and also for all traditional and atypical response personnel engaged in lifesaving and life-sustaining operations. This project will purchase and replace the expired EOD 9 with a new EOD 10.

Problem Statement:

The threat of ongoing Terrorism, Trans-National Gangs and civil unrest as referenced in The South Plain Regional THIRA on pages 10, 20 and 38. This upgrade will allow the Bomb Squad Technician to maintain enhanced protection and officer safety. The South Plains Regional Bomb Squad responds to calls in both rural and urban environments to render safe devices and suspected devices due to criminal incidents as well as industrial situations such as oil-field related explosives throughout the region. The South Plains Regional Bomb Squad handles calls for service from the law enforcement agencies, emergency management personnel and industry within the South Plains. These calls can range from searching for firearms and improvised explosive devices, to handling commercial grade explosives. Numerous oil field related companies in the region are licensed to use explosives, and the Bomb Squad is called when that type of material is suspected to be unstable, accidentally abandoned, or lost. In addition some military grade explosive devices are handled by the Bomb Squad. (usually, when a family member finds a war relic) The South Plains Bomb Squad also provides assistance to the Texas Department of Public Safety, the FBI, and BATFE when requested.

Existing Capability Levels:

The South Plains Regional Bomb Squad is currently a FEMA Type I Bomb Squad, that is capable of responding to more than one incident at the same time in both urban or rural environments. Our current EOD 9 Bomb suits are reaching end of life and need to be replaced and upgraded to the EOD 10 Bomb Suite for enhanced protection of our Bomb

Technicians.

Capability Gaps:

This upgrade provides a sustainment of response capability as referenced in The South Plain Regional SPR on pages 11, 13, 16 and 44 by providing provide protection to the Bomb Technicians, from a suspect package or device and provide enhanced safety of first responders and the public. Ability to respond throughout the region and surrounding region. We are the only FEMA Type I Bomb Squad within our region. This suit is required piece of PPE for Bomb Technicians. Provide response capabilities as a Type 1 Bomb Squad and provide protection to the Bomb Technician. A FEMA Type I Bomb Squad had the ability to respond to two (2) separate incidents at the same time with all of the required identification, communication, and remediation equipment.
